GB GOLDS FOR DINA & ½ MAR TEAM / MAGEEAN WINS / FRA JOINS ITA'S "LES BLEUS PARTY"

Women's 100m – Dina time but still hungry

Dina Asher-Smith regained the 100m title she had previously won in 2018 as she won her seventh European gold. It didn't go entirely to plan as she was seventh out of her blocks after a slow reaction (0.157) and still trailing at halfway. However, she produced one of her greatest ever finishes as she overhauled Ewa Swoboda and Italian Zaynab Dosso in 10.99. Less than a tenth covered the top six.

Asher-Smith ran a European lead in the semis of 10.96.

Amy Hunt was seventh in 11.15 after a 11.13 semi.

Women's 1500m – Magic Mageean as Bell sounds

Jemma Reekie looked in control as she hit the bell and held off the challenge from Georgia Bell and led into the straight, but she faded to fifth in 4:06.17.

Ireland's Ciara Mageean was easily the strongest as she completed her medal set after third in 2016 and second in 2022 and she won by five metres to the delight of the Irish fans. Second was a delighted Bell who won her first major medal. Katie Snowden was short of pace in the last lap and finished ninth in 4:06.83.

Men's 800m – Tual in the crown

On a good evening for France, World and Olympic finalist Gabriel Tual won very easily with a 51 final circuit and 25.57 last 200m as Spain and Italy took the other medals.

Elliot Giles was in contention at 600m but faded to seventh in 1:47.06

Women's High Jump – Ukraine again in the rain
Defending champion Yaroslava Mahuchikh won easily being clear up to 1.99m and then clearing 2.01m in often wet conditions.

Angela Topic won silver at the age of 18, 34 years after her father won the Men's HJ in Split in 1990.

On a good day for Ukraine, Iryna Gerashchenko took bronze. Morgan Lake was clear to 1.90m but failed at 1.93m to finish sixth overall.

Women's steeplechase – Alice in wonderland

Alice Finot, fifth in Budapest easily won after 12 runners had been locked together 500m out. She also survived a disqualification but was reinstated on appeal.

Two-time champion Gesa Felicitas Krause was second while UK record-holder Elizabeth Bird had her best run since medalling two years ago and suffering injury problems since her breakthrough season.

Women's triple jump final – Beyond Compaore

Olympic bronze medallist Ana Peleteiro-Compaore produced her big jump in round 4 – an equal leading European season performance of 14.85m to win easily. A Turkish record from Tugba Danismaz of 14.57m led until that point and that proved good enough for second as France picked up another medal in third.

Men's Hammer final – Nowicki and then beats all

Olympic champion Wojciech Nowicki led early on with a 80.14 second throw but dropped to third until his final throw of 80.95m gave him a narrow victory and his third successive European gold.

Bence Halasz was second as in 2022 as just 77 centimetres covered the medallists with Mykhaylo Kokhan gaining Ukraine another medal.

Jake Norris wasn't able to match his qualifying form and was tenth with 73.66m.

Women's 400m semis - Hurry Nielsen

Laviai Nielsen (23.95 at 200m) ran a PB 50.76 behind Rhasidat Adeleke's 50.54 which was fastest overall.

Victoria Ohurougu ran strongly to 300m but faded in the straight from third to sixth in 52.07.

Men's 400m semis - Dobson's choice

Charles Dobson (21.46 200m) with an effortless 44.65 was fastest. Alex Haydock Wilson was seventh in his race in 46.05.

Men's ½ Marathon - Yeman's yer man

Italy won their sixth and seventh gold medal of the championships as Yeman Crippa and Pieter Riva led Italy to team gold over Israel and Germany.

There were five still in contention approaching the stadium but predictably Crippa - the reigning 10,000m champion - kicked away in the tunnel. However, it was Riva who was fastest in last 200m as he caught Amanal Petros in the final straight and closed to a second behind the winner. Crippa's time was a Championship best.

Women's ½ Marathon - Super Calli fragilistic

5000m runner-up Karoline Grovdal who was the hunted in the short event was the hunter and kicked away after an hour to win easily from Joan Melly. The former Kenyan only held on to second by a few seconds from a superb strong run from Calli Hauger-Thackery who led Britain to a clear team gold by almost 3 minutes over Germany and Spain. Abbie Donnelly was 6th in 69:57 and Clara Evans 9th in a PB 70:06 and Lauren McNeil 17th 71:26.

Women's Hammer Q - additional Purchase

Katrina Jacobsen headed qualifying with 72.88m. Anna Purchase qualified with 68.91m with Charlotte Payne (68.66m) missing out by just 19cm.

Men's 200m semis – Tortu leans fasta

Filippo Tortu was easily quickest with 20.14. Jona Efolko was third in his semi in 20.73 and Jeriel Quainoo was seventh in his in 20.81 as they exited.

Men's Triple Jump - Happy Diaz

Jordan Diaz headed qualifying with 17.52m with 16.48m qualifying.

Men's high jump - Sottile difference

All 13 who cleared 2.21m made the final instead of the advertised 2.28m including three Italians who all had perfect records including Stefano Sottile

Women's 400mH heats - Jichova jumps over
Nikoleta Jichova was quickest with a PB 54.88 as 56.24 qualified for the semis.

Men's 400m hurdles heats – lifts the Barr

Thomas Barr followed up his mixed 4x400m gold with the fastest time of 49.31. Alastair Chambers qualified easily with 49.71 as 49.98 qualified.
