SWISS ON A ROLL / 400M BONANZA / MORE ITA & FRA GOLD / BRITS & IRISH MEDAL

Men's 400m – Doomsday for Bonnie Prince Charlie
Charlie Dobson looked superb in his semi-final and he went even faster in the final as his 44.38 easily bettered Ieuan Thomas's championships record. Unfortunately for him world indoor champion Alexander Doom proved much the stronger as his 44.15 Belgium record was the second fastest European mark ever and very close to Matthew Hudson's Smith's recent European record of 44.07. Dobson, who was 21.52 at 200m and 32.38 at 300m, moved up to fifth all-time in the UK a fraction behind Thomas (44.36), Richardson and Black (44.37). Luca Sito ran 21.26 to 200m but faded to fifth

Men's 3000SC – Miellet in the melee

France continued their Paris 2024 warm-up with another one-two as Alexis Miellet defeated Djilani Bedrani. Miellet's time was a PB as was bronze medallist Karl Bebenorf's time. For much of the race Italy's Osama Zoghliani had a good lead (5:31 at 2000m) but was caught on the last lap and faded to 8th. Mark Pearce had a solid run of 8:26.92 to finish 13th.

Women's Hammer – Fantina fantasy

Italian successes continued as the 2022 bronze medallist Sara Fantini won by over a metre with a 74.18m third round throw for her greatest performance to date. Second was the world's greatest ever women's hammer thrower Anita Wlodarczyk who showed a partial return to form to take silver. The Polish world record-holder is a four-time world and European champion and a three-time Olympic winner and she had all six throws over 71 metres. Fast improving Rose Loga, who was 20th in qualifying in Munich took bronze. Anna Purchase was a fine eighth in 69.24m

Women's PV – Swiss Moser poser for Molly

Molly Caudery was the only athlete to pass 4.43m and she cleared 4.58m first time. Defending champion Wilma Murto surprisingly exited at this height but seven remained with four including Caudery with a perfect record. Caudery failed her first attempt at 4.68m but former champion Katarina Stefanidi cleared first attempt to go ahead as Caudery cleared at the second time with Angelica Moser also going clear. Stefanidi cleared 4.73m first time too to take command and Caudery went clear at the second time. The shock though was Angelica Moser, who having failed twice at her opening height of 4.43m, went clear at a PB and Swiss national record equalling 4.78m and that was enough for gold as all three of the major contenders failed at 4.83m.

Men's 200m – Mumenthaler in time

After his 20.14 semi-final, all eyes were on Filippo Tortu who led into the straight as the crowd roared but he was unable to maintain and from lane nine 21 year-old Timothe Mumenthaler produced one of the week's biggest shocks with a 20.28 PB in his first senior championships Tortu was second and Switzerland underlined their relay credentials with a bronze too. Two of the nine were disqualified – one for a false start and one for a lane infringement.

Women's 400m – Kaczmarek wrecks Irish hopes

The talented 21 year-old Rhasidat Adeleke smashed her Irish record but lost out to the normally consistent but this time brilliant Natalia Kaczmarek who won in a stunning 48.98 for an exact half-second PB. Kaczmarek led at 200m (23.59 to 23.69) but Adeleke was ahead at 300m in 35.82 to 35.84. The Pole though fought all the way and opened up a metre at the finish though Adeleke underlined her championship credentials and won her second medal of the championships and Ireland's third. On the same day her sister set a 400m hurdles PB, Laviai Nielsen finished sixth in a PB 50.71.

Women's 200m semis – Neita and tidy

Daryll Neita was the fastest – just with a 22.51 as she won her semi impressively and defending champion Mujinga Kambundji won the final heat in 22.52 as a mediocre 22.84 made the final.

Women's 200m heats – Talea of the unexpected

German Talea Prepens was surprisingly fastest with a PB 22.83 as 23.42 qualified for the semis.

Decathlon Day 1 – Sander sure as Makeson stout

France's Makenson Gletty was top in the 100m with 10.55 while Markus Rooth headed the long jump with 8.01m but Johannes Erm held the lead after two events with 10.60 and 7.91m. Gletty went back in front with a 16.27m shot to lead Erm 2788 to 2779. Gletty jumped 2.02m in the high jump but Sander Skotheim cleared 2.17m to go ahead. In the 400m, Skotheim ran 47.50 for a total of 4566 pts with Gletty running a PB 47.60 for 4539 pts but moving into 2nd was Erm with 46.81 and 4541 pts.

Pole Vault qualifying – Blech clean through

A vault of just 5.60m qualified rather than the advertised 5.75m and eight had perfect records including Mondo Duplantis and Torben Blech.

Women's Javelin qualifying – Obst sticks cool

Only three made automatic qualifying with Marie Theres Obst the best with 61.45m. 57.71m qualified

Men's 1500m heats – Jakob crosses Riva

Neil Gourley won his heat impressively in 3:44.05 with a 52.2 final circuit easing back but quickest was Jakob Ingebrigtsen with 3:37.65 who went from last to first with a 53.04 last lap as he out dipped Federico Riva after four had fallen on the last lap. Adam Fogg was affected by the falls but was some way from qualifying in 10th in 3:40.83 but was surprisingly added to the final.

Women's 800m heats – Monster Majtie

Majtie Kolberg was fastest with 2:00.23 with defending champion Keely Hodgkinson winning her heat without fuss in 2:02.46 with a 28.02 last 200m. Alex Bell was a less comfortable third in her heat in 2:00.98. Erin Wallace didn't make an automatic qualifier but got a time spot with her fifth place in 2:00.90.

Men's 400m hurdles semis - Magi may

Rasmus Magi won the second semi with 48.43. In third Alastair Chalmers smashed his PB with 48.76 but just missed the Olympic qualifier and easily became the fastest ever non qualifier in the Championships history. Alessandro Sibilio was fastest with 48.07 with Karsten Warholm winning the other semi in 48.75.

Women's 400m hurdles semis – Cruise Lina

Lina Nielsen had a few technical problems but finished fast in second place in her semi in a PB 54.43. A below par Jessie Knight failed to qualify with 7th in 56.01. Predictably Femke Bol was fastest with 54.16 as 54.66 qualified for the final.
